



St. Andrew's by-the-Sea

Dear Friends,

Jesus rose early that morning to teach in the Temple, and the people gathered around to hear him (John 8:2-11). Only in this story in John do the scribes and Pharisees show up together. They brought, in tow, a woman caught in an adulterous situation. They declared her sin to Jesus in the presence of all who were there. They issued an ultimatum to Jesus, based on their reading of Moses' teaching: stoning is the only remedy for "such women." The narrative says that the goal of this ultimatum was to catch Jesus in an error and to find something with which to charge Jesus. The scribes and Pharisees act in opposition to Jesus, they are set against him, and oppose him directly.

But the woman is alone, her partner in adultery is nowhere to be seen. According to Leviticus and Deuteronomy, both offenders are to be stoned. If Jesus agreed that stoning is the correct answer, that would put Jesus in good stead with those testing him. But he listens and he writes on the ground instead. Not answering directly in a kind of frontal, oppositional assault, Jesus pinches their spirits instead, using an opposable maneuver that asks his hearers and interrogators to take a different stance and change their world view. Jesus responds by telling them they can cast the first stone if they have no sin. From the oldest to the youngest, they leave, no longer condemning the woman or Jesus. Jesus sends her on her way without condemnation, and with an admonition to sin no more.

In the story of the Un-condemned Woman from John 8, Jesus was given an either/or decision to make by religious authorities who sought to trap him. Correcting the legal experts directly about their misreading of the law would not have accomplished much and would probably have made matters worse. Jesus needed to help them change their minds and see the woman and their own sin in a new light. Similarly, for congregations today, difficulties and problems

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can arise that often stem from misconceptions caused by a world view that is not Christ-centered. The difficulties lead to a misapplication of that thinking to a church setting. These misconceptions and their misapplication can lead to problematic behaviors in a congregation, and that congregation can be hindered from living into the fullness of life that God offers.

While Jesus wrote on the ground, he weighed his options. He had to evaluate the needs of the people who were listening to his teaching, the woman, the missing adulterous man, and the religious leaders. Jesus called all who were present to repentance and change. Jesus honored the intent of the law (which was to remove the sinner from the midst of the congregation) and proposed something entirely new that challenged the assumptions of all who heard him. As he wrote on the ground a second time, he took the time to make the solution work. He waited. The process could not be hurried along because changing hearts takes a long time.

Treasurer's Report

The June Treasurer's Report to the Vestry (which reports parish financials through May) was provided on June 21st. Pledge income dropped off considerably in May, and was only about one-quarter of the amount received in April.

Thus, we have fallen back and we are now about 10% below budget for the year. Now would be a good time to review your pledge status for the year. The second quarter pledge statement will be in your mailbox in a few weeks. Our investments were up about 1% for the month, as good market conditions continue. Both our 1914 Society endowment and Reserve funds have appreciated about 10% for the year. Current year expenses through May were about \$9,000 above budget, but most of that (\$7,000) has to do with the timing of several payments vs. the budget assumptions on the timing of those payments. You can find the full Treasurer's Report in our document archive that is accessible through our website (www.standrewslc.org). Just click the Documents button at the bottom of the home page and enter the password *sakonnet* when prompted.

Last month I reported to you that the Small Business Administration had approved our Payroll Protection Program loan application. We did receive \$26,012 in May and this will really help us balance the budget should our income from fees for building use or fundraising fall short. This loan will qualify to be forgiven later this year.

We received a very generous gift from the estate of a 1914 Society member who passed away. I want to remind everyone that joining the 1914 Society is a great way to make a lasting contribution to St. Andrew's future. Please contact Lynn+, Spinner, Barbara or myself to find out more about the 1914 Society.

I want to express my thanks to all of you for your generous support during these trying times. For the past 107 years, St. Andrew's has always come together to meet the challenge, and you are upholding the tradition!

LOVE OUR NEIGHBOR - In the next few weeks Doug Orville will be telling you more about the Love Our Neighbor Program. It is a wonderful chance for each of us to get involved by supporting and helping spread the word to our neighbors in Little Compton, Tiverton and Westport. What does the program do? We understand that emergencies happen, and when they do, and all other agencies and options for help have been exhausted, the program can provide a onetime financial grant (up to \$1000.00) to be used for a car repair, appliance repair or replacement, home repair, etc. There is a complete application and review process in place that each potential client must go through and then each client is assigned a neighbor advocate as they go through the process. What the program CANNOT be used for is food, rent, utility, or bill payments, as funds are paid directly to the vendor, not the neighbor.
